MEMBER in the SPOTLIGHT Fred Eckert

Fred Eckert's parents, Fred and Betty, immigrated through Ellis Island,
New York, and settled in New York from Germany. Fred was born in Bronx, New
York and was raised along with his sister, Gerta. When he was two years old
they moved to New Jersey. His dad was a blacksmith, and Fred still has the
iron anvil that his dad left to him. Fred spent many a day working in his
dad's shop. His mom drove a school bus for a good many years.

When they first moved to New Jersey it was to an old house on a 5 acre parcel. The original house had no indoor plumbing. It wasn't long thereafter that his dad installed an electiric light to be used when visiting the outhouse. His parents bought 26 acres and built a new residence on the property, complete with modern plumbing, electricity, and toilets. Fred had a good childhood, and even became an Eagle Scout.

At age 14, something happened in his life that still remains with him to this day.

Fred is proud to show his Copper Canyon Mining Company stock certificate (in photo). The company of course no longer exists, but for young Fred Eckert, age 14, it was his entry into buying and selling stocks. It was a very incredible journey for a young man to become excited about learning about companies and buying their offerings. Shortly thereafter he parlayed a \$900 investment into reaping almost \$10,000 by the time he was nineteen. After finishing high school, Fred attended Trenton State College and majored in

1996 to College of New Jersey

Fred had wanted to be a stockbroker, however, the draft was an issue for him after college and instead of being drafted, he elected to join the Navy. In those days if an aviation officer candidate joined the Navy and they stayed six months and one day, their military obligation was completed, and they could not be drafted. Of course it was the duty of the Marine drill instructors to eliminate those trying to stay the duraton just to avoid the draft. Forty-eight, including Fred, started on a Sunday afternoon in 1971 at the Aviation Officer's Candidate School in Pensacola, Florida, and by Wednesday only 22 remained. Eventually, only 12 graduated, and he became a helicopter pilot in 1972, retiring from the Navy in 1992 with about 3,800 hours flight time.

After retiring from the service, he joined Chicago Title Insurance Company as a sales representative, and has been with them ever since. He even put together a book entitled "198 Super Things to Think, Say, and Do" in 2005 which is a complilation of inspirational sayings, well-known, anonymous and a few original. The book was underwritten by Chicago Title. In the book, Fred dedicates it to his late wife Susan, all of their joint children, as well as both sets of their parents.

Fred is a man of many hats. He is an active member of the San Diego
Downtown's Lion Club, Coronado Real Estate Association, former president of
San Diego Creative Investors Association, Coronado Historical Association, as
well as the Coronado Island Film Festival. He was a friend of George
Chamberlain, a radio talk host and investor, and played golf with him. He
believes in buying and holding stocks, and favors the "Dividend Aristocrats"
list of of published stocks.

It was Suzanne Manuel that introduced Fred to FOCUS. The more he learned about FOCUS the more involved he became. He quickly became a shopper, and

about FOCUS the more involved he became. He quickly became a shopper, and then another incident occurred which dramatically changed his outlook on abused kids. Fred was delivering FOCUS supplies to the Polinksky Center in San Diego when he saw, and listened to the stories of battered children being helped at the center.

"I encourage every FOCUS member to go as a shopper, and even with another FOCUS member, to actually be a witness at the facilities for the agencies that FOCUS supports. To see, hear, and converse with agency employees, will really make you understand and appreciate what FOCUS is all about."

Because of that experience, Fred continues to support FOCUS efforts. He has even challenged other FOCUS members by offering to match volunteer contributions on numerous occasions.

Fred has a rescued Shiba Inu that he got as a puppy, and has had for ten years so far. A Shiba Inu is considered an ancient Japanese hunting dog breed, and is small to medium in size. Sassy, as the dog is named, is very well-trained. Fred had Sassy lay on the floor while he placed a treat on top of each of her front paws. The dog just laid there, as Fred whispered to this writer to say, "Now." When the word "now" was spoken, Sassy came to life, jumped up, which then knocked the treats unto the floor, where she quickly picked up and ate the treats.

Fred plays golf with other FOCUS members. He can often be seen on the links with Fred Kallsen, John Lepore, and Bob Blongiewicz. He does 60 push-ups daily, and rides his bike all over Coronado. Bird houses he builds, and lots of them. In his backyard hangs about four or five, but in his frontyard, sideyard, and between the sidewalk and the curb, hangs many more of his creations. One of the bird houses by the curb has a solar panel which lights up the bird house at night, quite a treat during the day, and a trip by his house at night will reveal the dwelling for those birds deciding to check in for the night.

Fred is a very positive and inspirational person. He considers everyone a friend, and his heart, soul, and money go out to battered kids. Thank you Fred for being a "spotlight FOCUS member" and sharing your story, while encouraging
