October Funded Projects

SAN DIEGO MILITARY OUTREACH MINISTRIES

San Diego Military Outreach serves junior enlisted families, using many volunteer helpers. They have continued throughout the pandemic, using socially distanced drop-offs to provide diapers, wipes, food, school supplies. They also provide baby furniture, car seats, etc. when needed.

Request: Their emergency supply warehouse is in need of: four (4) cribs and mattresses, two (2) high chairs, and two (2) baby swings **Amount:** \$1,800

Our recent project to purchase lunch boxes with SD MOM was cancelled due to a timing conflict. This would be funded from The Linda Dorn Grant.

This is a transitional housing program for young adults-18-25, who are emancipated or currently in foster care, with the goal of equipping them with the skills and resources to succeed in independent living. They are recently authorized to increase the program to 60 participants from 45.

Member Spotlight by Don Swanson



Meet FOCUS Member Bob Jones

I knew Paul Pettit, long before I met Rosemary Pettit. I knew Fred Kallsen before I met Ethel. I knew Rolf Yngue before I knew Sharon Shelton. All of these men were married to distinguished FOCUS members. That being said, I knew Robert Jones, husband of Betty Jones, long before I knew him as Bob Jones. Let me explain.

Long, long ago, Robert Jones established a veterinary clinic in Bonita, California. Long, long ago equates to sixty, or seventy years, which was in the 1950's. Our family dog visited his clinic when I was a small boy. But this is not where the Bob Jones story begins.

Bob grew up on a small farm outside of Denver, Colorado, in a village called Wheat Ridge, which is now on Interstate 70. The elevation of Wheat Ridge is 5,459 feet above sea level. Just like the nursery rhyme, on his farm he had a cow, and a horse, and a few chickens, and rabbits too. He had three brothers, and along with Bob, all four of the Jones's boys joined the Navy, and fortunately all survived the war.

Bob attended veterinary school after the war on the G.I. bill, and after graduation he practiced his trade before moving to California in the early 1950's. Where Peohe's restaurant in Coronado now stands today, is where Bob first worked as a veterinarian in San Diego. He used to go to Clayton's for lunch on a regular basis.

To increase his income he also worked at the La Jolla Veterinary Hospital, as well as the Caliente race track in Tijuana, Mexico working with both the horses and the racing dogs. He told how some dog races were actually fixed to insure a certain dog would win. The owners would bind two or three of their toes together to decrease the spread of the dog's feet, thereby limiting their traction and not being able to compete at full capacity. Bob's task was to examine each dog prior to being put into the starting gates, which is where the unscrupulous owners did their bad activities.

He met Betty while she was visiting her aunt's family in La Jolla. A small group of her cousins' friends, along with Bob, took Betty grunion hunting off the Marina Room beach, but never encountered any grunion; a small fish, five or six inches in size and the female buries herself in the sand, tail first, at high tide, and the male wraps himself around her to deposit his sperm. Ten days later, at high tide, the eggs hatch and the young grunion enter into the sea.

Before returning to her hometown in Canada, Betty was given a tour of San Diego by Bob in a red MG, like the one used in the old television series McMillan and wife, the murder mystery show. The MG belonged to the owner of the animal hospital in La Jolla, but generously offered the car to Bob to help insure a successful romance with Betty. She also had a suitor in Canada, but Bob was relentless in his pursuit of her, and eventually they married.

Bob started his own practice on Sweetwater Road in the fifties, and after a couple of years Bob constructed a new hospital on the western side of Glen Abbey Cemetary on Bonita Road. He was there for forty years before he sold his business. They lived on a 19 acre parcel by Sunnyside Elementary School for thirty years. Their four children, three boys and a girl, were raised on this property along with chickens, horses, sheep, a cow, cats and dogs, as well as guinea pigs.

Betty tells the story of an African lion used by a circus in Mexico that had a baby cub. The circus had no use for two lions so the young lion ended up with the circus pilot's family in Mexico. This 90 pound feline cat resided with the Jones for a three or four day period recovering from surgery, because the lion's scent disturbed the hospitalized dogs. He even practiced his trade at the San Diego Zoo prior to the zoo having their own.

Bob's story does not end here. After retiring from selling his business he became a consultant for other veterinarians, and then in his late seventies, decided to go hiking and kayaking around the world. He has kayaked in 7 continents, and 27 countries in jaunts of one week to up to six weeks in duration, while Betty attended to the Children's Hospital in Mexico. His favorite spot for kayaking was on the Kamchatka Peninsula in Russia, which is between the Sea of Okhotsk on the west and the Pacific Ocean and Bering Sea on the east. He has kayaked there on the river as well as on the ocean.

If you want a good sleeping bag, make sure it is not duck down, but goose down, which provides better insulation in cold weather, says Bob.

He also tells of the bonding of young children with dogs, a well-known practice for young children who have social adjustment issues.

There is so much more to the story and stories of Robert Jones the veterinarian, as well as Bob Jones the world kayaker and hiker. He has always loved animals, and I can assure you that they loved him as well.

You already know about the work of Betty Jones and the Children's Hospital of Mexico, now you also know about her husband Bob Jones, who enjoys living in the Cays, having wonderful neighbors, swimming, kayaking, and/or walking daiily, and being the person the FOCUS spotlight shines on.
